



Eucharistic Prayer A

Celebrant The Lord be with you.
People And also with you.
Celebrant Lift up your hearts.
People We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. You bid your faithful people cleanse their hearts, and prepare with joy for the Paschal feast; that, fervent in prayer and in works of mercy, and renewed by your Word and Sacraments, they may come to the fullness of grace which you have prepared for those who love you. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

All sing:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

The people stand or kneel. Then the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. AMEN.

The Breaking of the Bread

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

Celebrant The Gifts of God for the People of God.

The congregation receives Holy Communion, kneeling at the High Altar rail, or at the standing station near the Pulpit. Gluten-free wafers are available at the Pulpit station.

Those not wishing to receive Communion may come forward for a blessing, signalling their intention by crossing their arms across their chests.

During Communion, prayer and anointing for healing is offered in the Lady Chapel for those who desire it.

The Book of Common Prayer reminds us that if one is unable to consume the consecrated bread and wine due to extreme sickness or disability, the desire is enough for God to grant all the benefits of communion (BCP, p. 457). When being present at a celebration of the Eucharist is impossible, this act of prayer and meditation can provide the means by which we can associate ourselves with the Eucharistic Action and open ourselves to God's grace and blessing.

Come Lord Jesus, and dwell in my heart in the fullness of your strength; be my wisdom and guide me in right pathways; conform my life and actions to the image of your holiness; and, in the power of your gracious might, rule over every hostile power that threatens or disturbs the growth of your kingdom, who with the Father and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen. (Spiritual Communion is excerpted from Saint Augustine's Prayer Book.)

Musical Notes

The Choir offers Choral Evensong at 5 p.m. today, singing music by Herbert Sumsion and Kenneth Leighton, including Sumsion's charmingly evocative anthem, *They That Go Down to the Sea*, based on verses from the Psalm assigned for today.

The Prelude today comes from a retrospective collection of his chorale-based pieces that Bach assembled in the last decade or so of his life. The chorale-text is a paraphrase and amplification of the "Agnus Dei," the final fixed element of the traditional Latin Mass (carried over, in German, into the Lutheran rite). The piece presents the entire chorale-melody three times in succession: first in the topmost voice of a three-voice texture, then in the middle voice of three, and, finally, as the bass voice of a fuller four-voice texture, briefly enriched to five voices near the end.

Timor et tremor comes from a collection of short, seasonal pieces composed by the long-time Organist of Gloucester Cathedral, Herbert "John" Sumsion (1899-1995; his music features prominently in Evensong this afternoon at 5). The piece is an understated setting of a traditional Latin text associated with Lent.

After a ten-year stint as a church-musician in Oxford, John Stainer (1840-1901) became the Organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, London in 1870. Worry over his health led him to retire in 1888, still quite young, and he lived out this retirement as an Oxford professor, and composing and conducting research into historical music. His most famous composition, a Passion-oratorio called *The Crucifixion*, dates from a year before he left St. Paul's. It achieved wide popularity on both sides of the Atlantic. Today's Offertory music is arguably the finest moment from that work, a setting of words from today's Gospel lesson.

The English composer Humphrey Clucas (b. 1941) was a choral scholar at King's College, Cambridge, as an undergraduate. (One of his most widely performed works is a set of Responses that he composed during those years.) O salutaris hostia dates from the mid-1980s; a solo treble presents the first stanza of the text, to a rather angular melody, joined by choir and organ for the second stanza.

The Postlude is one of Bach's larger prelude-and-fugue pairs for the organ. The opening section is essentially continuous arpeggiation, eventually with a supporting "pedal-point," a bass-note that undergirds the bulk of this section. A quick roulade closes the introductory section, and makes a transition to a fuller texture, integrating the hands and feet more than in the opening. This ultimately closes the Prelude, and offers a springboard into the Fugue. This fugue is built on quite a long theme, which is taken up by successive voices (four in all). Development of other, derived thematic material occupies the long middle section, eventually succeeded by a return of the first theme in another fugal exposition. A busy pedal-solo opens the coda, and quick manual figuration brings the piece to a fiery conclusion.

This Friday and Saturday evenings, March 15 and 16, Chatham Baroque presents *The Joy of Bach*, a concert celebrating the Leipzig master's music with cantatas and instrumental music, including the sixth "Brandenburg" concerto. Music at Calvary

Evensong for the month of March will take place **Today at 5 p.m.**, with an extended prelude played by local lutenist Alfonse Ciaccio beginning at 4:45. Please join us then, and on **Palm Sunday afternoon, March 24, also at 5 p.m.**, for a musical meditation on the Passion, a service somewhat reminiscent of Lessons and Carols, built around the narrative of the Passion and some of the beautiful musical responses that story has inspired from composers across the centuries.

Evening Prayer

As one of your Lenten disciplines, consider joining with other parishioners at Calvary for the service of Evening Prayer at 6 p.m. in the Lady Chapel each Monday and Thursday of Lent. We'll meet each Monday and Thursday through March 21. Praying at certain points of the day has its origins in Judaism and was practiced in the early church and monastic traditions. The service of Evening Prayer is about 20 minutes long and includes Psalms, Scripture, and Prayers for the day (but no sermon or music). Prayer and Anointing for Healing on Sundays at 11 a.m.

Gun Safety Legislation

Last May the Pennsylvania House of Representatives passed gun safety legislation with bipartisan support. These bills would establish universal background checks (HB 714) and create Extreme Risk Protection Orders (HB1018). The State Senate must hold hearings and vote on these bills in order for them to become law. This has not yet happened. Gun-safety advocacy groups are encouraging Pennsylvanians to contact the leaders of our State Senate and ask that the Senate move this legislation forward.

To help interested parishioners with this, a table of information and supplies will be set up in the Parish Hall on Sunday, March 17, before and after each service. Jeanette Trauth, a member of Temple Sinai and the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC), will be present during the Christian Formation hour (10–11 a.m.) that day to answer questions and otherwise help people write letters to Senate Judiciary Committee Chair Lisa Baker, Senate Majority Leader Joe Pitman, and Senate President Pro Tempore Kim Ward.


Food of the Month
