The Fourth Sunday in Lent March 10, 2024, at 5 o'clock in the afternoon



EVENSONG is the name given to the service for evening created for the first English Book of Common Prayer, published in 1549. This liturgy combines elements of two medieval monastic services—Vespers, offered at about sundown, and Compline, sung just before bed-time. Its essential shape consists of three sections: psalm-singing, readings (answered in song by canticles drawn from scripture, the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, both from the Gospel of St. Luke), and prayers. In Choral Evensong, these elements are mostly offered by the Choir, singing on behalf of the congregation, either in dialogue with the officiant or on its own. The congregation joins the choir in singing the Creed and the hymns.

The Second Lesson

Musical Notes

Warm thanks to lutenist Alfonse Ciaccio for playing the Prelude this afternoon.

The English organist and composer Herbert "John" Sumsion (1899-1995) was the organist of Gloucester Cathedral from 1928 until 1967, having sung there as a boy-chorister under his predecessor, and training generations of choristers across that long span. In retirement he remained active as a composer, conductor, and organist. Today's canticles were published in 1943, less than halfway into Sumsion's tenure at Gloucester. The Introit, *Timor et Tremor*, comes from a collection of "Nine Introits for the Seasons of the Church's Year," published in 1986; several of these pieces, including today's, are dedicated to Dennis Kiddy and the Choir of St. Edmund's School, Canterbury, where Kiddy oversaw the musical education of the Cathedral boy-choristers. Sumsion also composed today's anthem, *They That Go Down to the Sea in Ships*, for Kiddy during his earlier tenure at the Repton Preparatory School; it dates from 1979.

Two weeks hence, on the afternoon of Palm Sunday (March 24 at 5 p.m.) the Choir will offer a Musical Meditation on the Passion of Christ, a service inspired by one developed at St. John's College, Cambridge, as a kind of summary overview of the liturgical experience of Passiontide. Readings trace the narrative of Jesus' final days in Jerusalem, and music for choir, for organ, and for congregation, reflects on the events of those days and their significance for our salvation.
