

# A Musical Meditation on the Passion of Christ

Palm Sunday Evening March 24, 2024, at 5 P.M.

#### About the Service

This service is inspired, in a very general way, by a service introduced in the Chapel of St. John's College, Cambridge, in the 1980s, as a means of providing a shared Lenten worship experience, grounded in the events of Holy Week, for a community that was generally dispersed at that time of year. The rite has been borrowed into wider use, and has become a treasured feature of the Lent and Holy Week journey in a number of worshipping communities around the Anglican Communion, including American congregations. While its realization this afternoon is quite different in detail from the service created by George Guest and sustained by his successors, we hope that it will provide a similarly effective means of entering into the contemplation of the Passion.

After the entrance of the ministers and a Bidding Prayer, the service unfolds as a series of readings from the Gospels, marking successive stages of the Passion, from the Triumphal Entry to the Burial of the crucified Christ. Each reading is introduced by a set of versicles and responses, drawn from Scripture; following each reading, reflection is shaped by choral music and congregational hymns, leading to a brief prayer. All are invited to join in the responses, hymns, and prayers as fully as they desire.

## SCRIPTURAL SENTENCE & BIDDING PRAYER all standing

My brothers and sisters, as this Holy Week begins, let us draw near to the foot of the Cross, and dare to look upon the one who has been pierced. Let us read and mark in Holy Scripture the tale of the sufferings of God's Son, which he bore for the redemption of his people.

But first, let us join our hearts and minds in prayer for the needs of his whole world; for peace and goodwill over all the earth, especially in the holy city of Jerusalem; for the health and safety of people everywhere; and for the mission and unity of the Church for which he died, particularly in this country, and within this city.

And, following the example of our Lord, who, even in the midst of his suffering, showed compassion for the needy, let us at this time remember in his Name the poor and the helpless; the hungry and the oppressed; the imprisoned and those in mortal danger; the sick and those who mourn; the lonely and the unloved; the aged and the little children; and all those who know not the Lord Jesus, or who love him not, or who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

Lastly, let us remember before God, Mary, his Mother, who gazed upon her Son in his last hour, and all those who have stood, like us, in contemplation of the Cross, but who now gaze in adoration upon the Paschal Lamb upon another shore, bathed in a greater light, that multitude which no one can number, whose hope was in the One who died for us all, and with whom, in this Lord Jesus, we for evermore are one. These prayers and praises let us humbly offer up to the throne of heaven, in the words which Christ himself hath taught us:

# A Reading from the Gospel according to St. Matthew

After the woman anointed Jesus' feet at Bethany, one of the twelve, who was called Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests and said, "What will you give me if I deliver him to you?" And they paid him thirty pieces of silver. And from that moment he sought an opportunity to betray him. After the chief priests and elders delivered Jesus to Pilate, the governor, and Judas saw that he was condemned, he repented and brought back the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders, saying, "I have sinned in betraying innocent blood." They said, "What is that to us? See to it yourself." And throwing down the pieces of silver in the temple, he departed; and he went and hanged himself. But the chief priests, taking the pieces of silver, said, "It is not lawful to put them into the treasury, since they are blood money." So they took counsel, and bought with them the potter's field, to bury strangers in. Therefore that field has been called the Field of Blood to this day. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken by the prophet Jeremiah, saying, "And they took the thirty pieces of silver, the price of him on whom a price had been set by some of the sons of Israel, and they gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord directed me.

# A Reading from the Gospel according to St. Mark

Pilate asked Jesus, "Are you the King of the Jews?" And he answered him, "You have said so." And the chief priests accused him of many things. And Pilate again asked him, "Have you no answer to make? See how many charges they bring against you." But Jesus made no further answer, so that Pilate wondered. Now at the feast he used to release for them one prisoner for whom they asked. And among the rebels in prison, who had committed murder in the insurrection, there was a man called Barabbas. And the crowd came up and began to ask Pilate to do as he was wont to do for them. And he answered them, "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?" For he perceived that it was out of envy that the chief priests had delivered him up. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release for them Barabbas instead. And Pilate again said to them, "Then what shall I do with the man whom you call the King of the Jews?" And they cried out again, "Crucify him." And Pilate said to them, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Crucify him." So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released for them Barabbas; and having scourged Jesus, he delivered him to be crucified. And the soldiers led him away inside the palace (that is, the praetorium); and they called together the whole battalion. And they clothed him in a purple cloak, and plaiting a crown of thorns they put it on him. And they began to salute him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" And they struck his head with a reed, and spat upon him, and they knelt down in homage to him. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak, and put his own clothes on him. And they led him out to crucify him. —Mark 15:2-20

# A Reading from the Gospel according to St. Matthew

When the soldiers had mocked Jesus, they stripped him of the robe, and put his own clothes on him, and led him away to crucify him. As they went out, they came upon a man of Cyrene, Simon by name; this man they compelled to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull), they offered him wine to drink, mingled

with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his garments among them by casting lots; then they sat down and kept watch over him there. And over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus the King of the Jews." Then two robbers were crucified with him, one on the right and one on the left. And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." So also the chief priests, with the scribes and elders, mocked him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he desires him; for he said, 'I am the Son of God.'" And the robbers who were crucified with him also reviled him in the same way.


