I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you--unless you have come to believe in vain. When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. The Book of Common Prayer reminds us that if one is unable to consume the consecrated bread and wine due to extreme sickness or disability, the desire is enough for God to grant all the benefits of communion (BCP, p. 457). When being present at a celebration of the Eucharist is absolutely impossible, this act of prayer and meditation can provide the means by which we can associate ourselves with the Eucharistic Action and open ourselves to God's grace and blessing.

Come Lord Jesus, and dwell in my heart in the fullness of your strength; be my wisdom and guide me in right pathways; conform my life and actions to the image of your holiness; and, in the power of your gracious might, rule over every hostile power that threatens or disturbs the growth of your kingdom, who with the Father and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen. (Spiritual Communion is excerpted from Saint Augustine's Prayer Book.)

Our Parish Life

A reverent and respectful way to receive Communion is as follows:

To receive the Body of Christ, kneel and place your right hand over your left and hold them palm up so that the priest or deacon can easily place the bread on the palm of your hand. (Please do not hold up thumb and forefinger for receiving.) You may then consume it, or you may hold it for intinction (dipping in the chalice).

If you would prefer not to receive the Blood of Christ, you may leave the rail after consuming the bread. The full benefit of Communion is still conferred by the bread alone.

To receive the Blood of Christ, gently grasp the base of the chalice and guide it to your mouth. For intinction, carefully dip the wafer in the chalice and consume it. Wait to leave the rail until the person after you has received the chalice, to avoid jostling.

After receiving the Body and Blood of Christ, return to your seat. It is customary in the Episcopal Church that we spend some moments in personal prayer after receiving communion. Choir anthems and congregational communion hymns are chosen to assist such devotion, and worshipers are encouraged to join in the latter.

Evening Prayer

Evening Prayer on Mondays and Thursdays will continue through Easter Season, beginning on Thursday, April 4. We will meet each Monday and Thursday through May 23 at 6 p.m. in the Lady Chapel. (The only exception is Ascension Day, Thursday, May 9, when Evensong will be offered at 7:30). Please join us!

Praying at certain points of the day has its origins in Judaism and was practiced in the early church and monastic traditions. Evening Prayer is derived from the monastic prayer services and is one of the Daily Offices found in our Book of Common Prayer. The service of Evening Prayer is about 20 minutes long and includes Psalms, Scripture, and Prayers for the day (but no sermon or music).
