A Service of Thanksgiving for the Life of John E. O'Rourke August 27, 1937—January 21, 2024 Thursday, April 11, 2024, at 11 o'clock in the morning in the Lady Chapel The liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all its meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we, too, shall be raised. The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend Lazarus. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

Entrance Anthem

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. Through Jesus Christ our Lord; who rose victorious from the dead, and comforts us with the blessed hope of everlasting life. For to your faithful people, O Lord, life is changed, not ended; and when our mortal body lies in death, there is prepared for us a dwelling place eternal in the heavens. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Celebrant and People

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The people stand or kneel. Then the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. AMEN.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.

Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; Celebrant Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia. People

All	Give rest, O Christ, to your servant with your saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.

The Celebrant, facing the body, says

Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servant John. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a sinner of your own redeeming. Receive him into the arms of your mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light. *Amen.*

John E. O'Rourke, 86, passed away at Concordia Fox Chapel on January 21, 2024. John was born in Ambridge, PA in 1937. After graduating from Ambridge High School, he moved to Connecticut, and shortly thereafter joined the US Marine Corps, where he served for 4-1/2years. He was stationed in Okinawa, Hawaii, and aboard ship in Lebanon. After his tour of duty, he attended the University of Connecticut where he earned a degree in political science. He then moved to Detroit, MI for his career in the US Customs Service. It was there that he met his wife, Peggy -- an office romance that lasted 54 years. They lived in Alexandria, VA, for nearly 30 years. Much of his career was spent in Washington, DC, and his official duties took him to many wonderful places: Paris, Greece, Cyprus, Indonesia, China, Japan, El Salvador, Portugal, Austria, Egypt, and Israel, as well as many cities in the US and Canada. John was an avid reader, and could often be seen in his favorite chair smoking his pipe, reading a good book. After retiring, he earned a masters degree in history from George Mason University. He was a sports fan, and enjoyed the Washington (now) Commanders football team, and attended many Washington Capitals hockey games. He enjoyed watching the Steelers, Penguins and Pirates on TV. When Peggy also retired, they moved to Pittsburgh in 2001. John loved big dogs, and over the years had a series of 5 dogs, three of which were rescues. They have been members of Calvary Episcopal Church since moving to Pittsburgh. He leaves behind his wife of 54 years, and his brother-in-law Joseph Savage of New Mexico.
